Focus on creating something, in short form, that tells the reader that message. Don't worry about rhyming at this point- you will learn about song structure and rhyme schema after you finish this assignment.

Song Structure

There are more than a few song structures, so you can find one that is the best fit for your song. You are expected to use the first example; however, you can use the second as well.

- 1. Verse, Chorus, Verse, Chorus. (this is the structure of "Falling Down")
 - a. Verse 1: The first verse needs to give details as to what the song is about. This does not tell the listener directly what it is about, but it leads up to it. The chorus should reveal the central meaning of the song.
 - b. Chorus: The chorus still follows the second verse, and it remains the same as the chorus after the first verse.
 - c. Verse 2: This second verse **may** have different lyrics and a slightly different melody than the first verse. For this assignment, the words need to be different from the 1st verse.
 - d. Chorus: The chorus still follows the second verse, and it remains the same as the chorus after the first verse.
- 2. Verse-Chorus-Verse-Chorus-Bridge-Chorus Structure:
 - a. Verse: Sets up the story or situation, with a certain melody and chord progression.
 - b. Chorus: Repeats at regular intervals, providing a catchy and memorable anchor for the song.
 - c. Verse2: Continues to build upon the story/narrative of the song with more details.
 - d. Bridge: A contrasting section that provides a break from the repetition of verses and choruses. The bridge often introduces new lyrics, melody, or chords, adding variety to the song.
 - e. Chorus: Returns after the bridge, often with heightened emotional intensity.

Rhyme Schema

Experiment with different rhyme schemes (ABAB, AABB, etc.) to find what works best for your song. A rhyme scheme is the ordered pattern of rhymes at the ends of the lines of a poem or verse.

1. Re-write your chorus using your chosen rhyme scheme. For example, ABAB indicates that the 1st and 3rd line will rhyme, and the 2nd and 4th

		line will rhyme. Also, it is important to know that not every chorus fits into a common rhyme schema. For example, the song "Falling Down" used a AAAB rhyme scheme: 2. Write out your own chorus again, using a rhyme schema
